

Define Redistricting

What is redistricting?

- Redistricting is the process used by governments to redraw political boundaries.
- Redistricting is based on the idea of "one person, one vote".
- This process is used to ensure that each person can be represented fairly.
- Legislative Districts are created to have the same number of people.



Census Data

Why is the Census important for redistricting?


- The redistricting process occurs every 10 years after the Federal Decennial Census is complete.
- Census data is used to draw new legislative maps to account for population changes across communities.



North Dakota Legislature

How is the redistricting process established?

- The North Dakota State Legislature is responsible for drawing state legislative district boundaries
- Legislators create a bill to establish the process for North Dakota.
- HB 1397 was passed on April 22, 2021.



North Dakota Legislature Cont.

House Bill 1397

AN ACT to establish a legislative management redistricting committee, to provide for the implementation of a legislative redistricting plan, to exempt drafts of redistricting plans from open records requirements, to provide for public access to plans that are distributed or reported, and to provide for a special legislative session; to provide an expiration date; and to declare an emergency.



ND Redistricting Committee

How does the redistricting committee work?

- North Dakota establishes a legislative management redistricting committee.
- A committee chair is appointed to select committee members.
- The Redistricting Committee hosts public hearings across the state.
- Public Hearings are for citizens to address their concerns or support of redistricting.



 - 47 Senate Members are Elected
 - 2021 Seats 40 R & 7 D
 - 94 House of Representatives are Elected
 - 2021 Seats 80 R & 14 D

Single Member House Districts

What is a single member house district?


The idea of a single member house district or split house district, is that the legislative district be split into two parts (example: District 31A & District 31B). In theory, citizens who live within the boundaries of 31A will vote for a single member and 31B will vote for a single member. This allows 2 house members to be elected to legislature but they represent the split populations in that district.

Single Member House Districts

How can we split the house district without losing people?

(2011 Population Requirement: 14,310 per district)



Prison Populations

How are the incarcerated people counted in redistricting?



North Dakota law says a prison cell is not a residence:

 "A prison cell is not a residence in North Dakota because a residence is where one chooses to be and return to when one is not being called away to other places for temporary purposes." (N.D. Cent. Code, § 54-01-26.)

Prison Populations

Why are my relatives not being counted in their hometown?

- District 30: Incarcerated people account for 4.5% of the total population.
 According to the 2010 census, there were 791 Native American people in that district, 144 of whom are incarcerated.
- District 12: Incarcerated people account for 3% of the total population.
 According to the 2010 census, there were 260 Native American people in that district, 94 of whom are incarcerated.

Deviations

What is a deviation? Why is it used in redistricting?

Definition: the action of departing from an established course or accepted standard.
